Sampling method	Respondents were selected from YouGov's opt-in panel to be representative of adult U.S. citizens.
Sample composition	2,170 started the survey after screenouts. 246 were deleted due to breakoffs, 249 were removed for interview completion time under 5 minutes, 39 were removed for attention check failures, and 62 were removed for data quality control. The reporting is based on the remaining 1,574 respondents.
Weighting	The sample was weighted according to gender, age, race, education, 2020 election turnout and Presidential vote, baseline party identification, and current voter registration status. Demographic weighting targets come from the 2019 American Community Survey. Baseline party identification is the respondent's most recent answer given around November 1, 2022, and is weighted to the estimated distribution at that time (33% Democratic, 31% Republican). The weights range from 0.051 to 6.52, with a mean of one and a standard deviation of 0.792.
